8th December 2022, Kalumburu Community



We need one person per household to learn parenting, mental health, disabilities and relationship skills that will strengthen the family unit and identify services needed and learn how to develop a budget to survive day to day. We need to clean our households, so we have healthy families. We need to have good structures in our homes, so our kids have good routines.

We need to provide **education** for kids that are **disengaged** and continue the 2-way learning already implemented in school. We can do this by scoping **alternative education models** and strengthening the **2-way learning** by building more community capacity for teaching or education assistants.

We need to **support and build strong families**; we can do this by having strong **leadership** and providing family **community activities** for individual or community healing.

We need to provide a **safe space** for **our men**, to restore family **balance**, we can do this by investing in the **Men's Program** and

advocating for their **own centre/shed.**

We need our own **community justice** system to get kids & families going **Back to Country and on Culture Camps** instead of going to detention/jail.

We need access to **good** nutritional **food**; we can do this by **restoring** our **community garden.**



Kalumburu Community Forum 8 December 2022

This was a local Empowered Communities forum where Kalumburu Aboriginal people had their voices included in the Regional Development Agenda for Kalumburu and the East Kimberley.

We are focussing on five important areas where we want to see things improve. Together we are making a peoples movement and plan for change led by community voice and supported by Government.

"Kalumburu Old People were strong, Kalumburu needs to be strong again"



We need to look after our **Elders** to provide space for practical intergeneration learning, revival of cultural identity and documenting of **language**, arts & culture.

We can **build** strong families by teaching the **whole** family unit about **language**, **arts and culture**.

We need more power for **mandatory protocols** when entering community, we can do this by designing our own **protocols** and **cultural awareness**.

We need to change local gambling behaviours across the community to positive learning experiences around financial budgeting and family orientated activities. We need to provide our working parents a Day Care Centre for them to stay in employment. We can do this by training early years educators and scope funding for infrastructure.



We will work with the **school** to provide **alternative educational pathways** for

kids/teenagers dropping out of school, we can achieve this by working with parents to **build respect** and **value for education**. We need to teach our **young adults life skills** by giving them the **right training and opportunities** to have their say about their **issues** and **affairs** in the right **platform & space**.

We need to have **community training opportunities** so we can maintain our own roads, housing, infrastructure & recycling, we can do this by partnering with **EJKP & NRTAFE** to deliver place-based training that aligns with community **employment** opportunities. We need to **build capacity and skills** sets so local people are employed in these FIFO

/DIDO services.




We need to learn, reflect, analysis and interpret **data** around population, **housing, employment & health** so data can reflect current circumstances.




