Now is the time for decisive action, and the international development sector is calling on the government to boldly invest in the future by focusing on four key areas:



Unlocking Girls' Potential Through Education: Around 130 million girls worldwide are out of school, including 32 million of primary school age. Education is fundamental to empowering girls and breaking the cycle of poverty. Canada will double down on the impacts driven by the Charlevoix Education Initiative and will launch a new global commitment to expand the education system's capacity to prevent violence, build social cohesion, and promote resiliency, recovery, and peace.

Securing Our Investment in Women and Adolescent Health: Women's health and access to sexual and reproductive rights are fundamental human rights. Canada will continue to advocate for comprehensive women's healthcare services, ensuring proper financing of key programs and empowering all women and girls with the resources and agency to control their bodies and futures, while staunchly opposing the anti-rights movement to secure rights for future generations.

Leading on Global Climate Action: As Canada prepares for the next COP meeting and to host the G7 summit, it needs to reaffirm its role as a leader in combating climate change. With mounting environmental challenges threatening ecosystems and livelihoods worldwide, Canada's global positioning becomes increasingly critical. Not only by championing ambitious emissions reduction targets, fostering international cooperation on green transition initiatives, and supporting climate adaptation and loss and damage funding and appropriate measures that address the needs of vulnerable communities, Canada can set a precedent for effective climate action. Canada has a unique opportunity to step up its leadership and rebuild trust with those least responsible for the growing impacts of climate change around the world. As a central player on the world stage, Canada has the opportunity not only to lead by example but also to inspire collective global efforts towards a greener and more resilient future for generations to come.
